

Recreation, support wildlife and cultural heritage most important ES

Recreation: coast Wildlife: mixed broadleaf forest Cultural heritage: shelterbelts, agricultural fields Majority does not like additional housing, but they do think it is necessary

75 % thinks that residential development will have negative impact on ES 52,7 % woodlands can compensate for housing

79,1 % compensation should be obligatory





Work in progress

Further analyses to indentify **differences between groups of people** and **preferences for environmental compensation**



Recommendations for spatial planning and landscape management, concerning:

- the relative value people attach to different landscape elements
- socio-cultural trade-offs between different land use types and ecosystem services provided
- opportunities and pitfalls of environmental compensation, from a sociocultural perspective.
